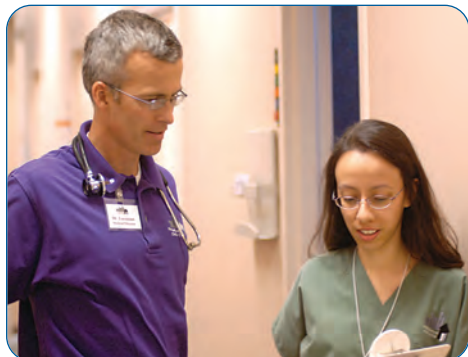

Grateful Hearts

What thought comes to mind when you hear the news that a 40 year old friend has had a heart attack? Probably something like “How could this happen, he is so young!” Or possibly “How is his wife going to manage now, with no income and young children?” As a medical doctor, I watch families walk through these crises on an ongoing basis. Some families respond with fear or bitterness, but others demonstrate an amazing degree of trust in the Father.



Carlos, for years, has had the spirit of a young man but has struggled with ongoing severe medical illnesses. Diabetes began to assault his body at age 22, and by the time we began caring for him in his 40's, he required the care of multiple specialists. Nevertheless, we were all surprised when he spent early November in the hospital for a heart attack. Only 49 years old, with a family and children, and multiple medical complications, he would be permanently disabled by any standard.

As we talked during his most recent visit, his usual smile spread across his face. Seated next to him with a smile equally radiant, his wife knitted clothes for the new grandchild expected to arrive soon. I worked through all the relevant medical issues, but wondered how they would ever manage to pay their bills and provide for their family without medical insurance or disability benefits. As they left, they again expressed their gratitude for the care they receive through our clinic, and for a gift they had received from clinic staff and volunteers who had heard of their plight.

A few days later, our nurse asked me to stop by the conference room.

When I walked in, Carlos and his wife were presenting the lunch they had prepared for the staff and volunteers.

A week later, they returned with another meal. Each time, they shared what the clinic has meant to them.

I praise God for the testimony of Carlos and his wife. They don't know how they will get through the next few months, but they are trusting God today for his provision, and have joy in their hearts that is independent of their circumstances.

It's worth looking back to some highlights of 2013 to “remember” what God did for the Clinic and His people in Central Phoenix.

Highlights of 2013: patient visits increased by 9% to 10,201; 87 new volunteers were added; volunteer hours increased by 15.4% to 9,809.5 (nearly 5 FTE); pro-golfer Tom Lehman and Alan Sears of Alliance Defending Freedom spoke at Clinic forums; medications with a value in excess of \$250,000 were donated; donations made possible a much needed remodel of the Clinic with new flooring, paint and landscaping; donations also made possible computer server upgrades to support medical and dental electronic record databases; and, Virginia G. Piper Charitable Trust, BHHS Legacy and the Board of Visitors continued

Meet Lisa M. Kill, CNOR, CRNFA, FNP-BC

I was born number six of eight children in a small farming community in northern Alberta, Canada. I went on to get my MSN FNP and continued working at the Mayo Clinic in Gynecology, where I learned from some very skilled and experienced physicians. I have been a lecturer and instructor for the British Columbia Institute of Technology and the Mayo Clinic in Phoenix. I am also certified through the Bioidentical Hormone Initiative, State University of New York Downstate Medical Center.

My husband and I have since become US citizens. We have experienced so many fabulous opportunities here and we feel blessed to live in such a beautiful city, as well as a country that has allowed us to thrive. As my father taught me so many years ago, I felt the need to share my knowledge and experience and to begin to give back to my community. Volunteering at TNCC allows me, in some small way, to return the many blessings I have enjoyed. The experience is grounding, humbling, and faith affirming. There are mornings I struggle to get out of bed, but the enthusiasm and commitment of the folks at TNCC and the humble gratitude of Clinic patients, makes me feel honored to have the opportunity to serve. I always walk away having received more than I have given.
